In 2008, Mr. Heintzman received the Ontario Bar Association Award for Excellence in Civil Litigation. Mr. Heintzman is a past adjunct professor at Osgoode Hall Law School (Trial Advocacy) and the University of Toronto Law School (Computers and the Law; Contested Corporate Transactions) and since 2012 he has been an adjunct professor at Western Law School (Advanced Contract Issues).

Mr. Heintzman was educated at Harvard University (1962, BA *cum laude* in economics), the University of London (1967, LLB) and Osgoode Hall Law School (1966, LLB). He was called to the bars of Ontario and is a past member of the bars of Alberta and Newfoundland. In 2012 he was designated a Fellow of the Chartered Institute of Arbitrators.

Immanuel Goldsmith, Q.C., was senior counsel at McCarthy Tétrault and appeared regularly before the Federal Court of Appeal and the Supreme Court of Canada for forty years before he passed away on July 5, 2003.
